Search and Rescue Exercise a Success

In a simulation designed to enhance its search and rescue capabilities, the Lakes Region Community Emergency Response Team, LR-CERT, conducted a series of search exercises at the Belknap County Fairgrounds in Belmont on November 6.

Cliff Dickinson, Team Captain for the Search & Rescue Unit, organized the series of drills which were attended by a dozen CERT members. Cliff did a great job designing this training, down to details of "clues" left behind in different locations throughout the fairgrounds. There were line searches, building searches, and searching for moving victims. We used CERT's family service radios to communicate with the different teams during the exercise, making it a good team building exercise as well.

A new member of CERT, John Jonasch, has created a very detailed "CERT Go Bag" list that he shared with the membership. He reminds us of some good ideas when assembling and maintaining our go bags:

- John maintains the "kitchen sink" in his bag, taking out and leaving in his car those things not needed for that activation, that way he always has all he needs.
- His list of contents is dated when checked, states where items are in the pack if not in the main compartment, and keeps this list in his pack.
- Periodically re-checks contents, maintains current meds.

This was a day long conference to educate people from around the state to understand the challenges to emergency preparedness, response and recovery faced by individuals with functional needs during emergencies. There were panelists representing the spectrum of emergency preparedness from all around the state, including our very own Kathleen Merriam. There were also four breakout sessions that covered topics like Enhanced 911, Adult and Child Care Facility Emergency Planning, and Assistive Technology Solutions. More For Those Who Missed It

Regional Swat Team Training—October 20. What an evening at the Belknap County Sheriff's Dept, and I don't mean from behind bars! Twenty-two CERT members were introduced to the BRSOU, Belknap Regional Special Operations Unit, and the Bearcat, or Armored Rescue Vehicle. Sheriff Wiggin, operation commander of the 22 SOU team members, put on a power point lecture, with input from Dave Perkins, swat team leader. They detailed the structure of the SOU, including negotiators and snipers. Snipers, we learned, primarily act as forward observers and intelligence gatherers. There are currently 11 multijurisdictional SOUs across the state, with our local one consisting of Belknap County groups along with the town of Moultonboro. We were given a tour of the bulletproof "Bearcat" which is used to move up close to a building or place where a suspect might be hiding. We also got to sit in the mobile command vehicle and get a feel of where the planning and decisions take place.

<u>Fall CERT Graduation</u>- November 11. Taylor Community Woodside saw the graduation of 10 people from the CERT class, once again facilitated by Kathleen Merriam and taught by a wonderful group of first responders. Five of those graduates went on to apply and were accepted onto the CERT team. Many of the new members have already been involved in a number of activities including the S&R training and the CERT Christmas party. CERT Activations on the Rise

On three recent occasions LR-CERT was called upon to assist the Laconia Police Department. The first occurred on Sunday evening, November 21 when a multi-unit apartment building on Union Ave. caught fire. Traffic had to be restricted on Union and surrounding streets. At the same time, police were responding to an armed robbery on Court St. The CERT volunteers were able to take over traffic duties, thus allowing police to attend to crowd control at the scene as well as investigate the robbery. The team worked for 3 hrs.

The next Sunday, about 5:00 am, the team got another call from the Laconia Police Dept. to cover traffic after an early morning fire broke out on Mechanic St. in Lakeport. Several streets had to be closed to allow the fire department to douse the flames. It was a cold morning and those who responded covered traffic for 2 1/2 hrs.

Then on December 13, we got the call to cover a closed Messer St. in Laconia. Again, the team re-

sponded quickly, controlling the flow of traffic for about 3.5 hrs.

A big thanks to Dick Christopher, Dave Stamps, Tom and Debbie Murphy, Rob MacGuffie, Jim White, Mike Hardy and Kathleen Merriam for their quick responses to these activations.

Without the hard work of Kathleen Merriam, all of these members might have slept through the night! Capt. Steve Clark, LPD, took Kathleen around to area police departments to introduce her and CERT to the depts. Dep. Chief Steve Currier, GFD, introduced Kathleen to Chris Kelly of GPD. These meetings allowed Kathleen to inform the different depts. of what CERT is capable of doing and when we can be useful. Well, it worked!



Meadowbrook Fire Rehab Drill

On Saturday, Dec 11, members of the LR-CERT team supported the Gilford Fire Rescue in rehab duties for a controlled burn of a vacant house on Meadowbrook property in Gilford. Meeting at the fire station at 6:45 am, plans were make with attention to safety of personnel and property and then all headed over to Meadowbrook, accompanied by several fire fighting vehicles. Fires were started and extinguished to create various scenarios for the firefighters to train with, ending in a spectacular blaze that reduced the house to embers. CERT members set up the rehab tent, table and chairs and provided hot and cold drinks, along with sandwiches throughout the drill. Tom Murphy, Rehab Leader, was trained to fill the depleted air bottles in the GFD rehab trailer. Tom's work was a huge help to the fire dept. as it freed up the firefighters to concentrate on their training. CERT members assisted in packing up the equipment, then conducted their own "hot wash" on site before leaving about 1 pm. Cooperative trainings such as this help the first responders and the CERT members develop trust in a working relationship. We appreciate all opportunities to work with the various departments in our area.

ICE: In Case Of Emergency

ICE is a method of contact during emergencies. We all carry cell phones with numerous names and numbers of friends and family. All you need to do is store the number of a person or persons to be contacted in case of an emergency under the name ICE. This way, health care providers can look in your
